

### MORE ON HOT WATER HEATERS

The Board has published two articles in this newsletter in recent months discussing the question of subcontracting from unlicensed people, whether big retailers or otherwise, and discussing concerns about helping people or corporations without license who act as plumbing or heating contractors by offering to do plumbing or heating contracting.

In the aftermath of these newsletter articles we have received questions about whether there has been any change in the Board Rules about replacement of hot water heaters.

The Board has, for many years, defined minor repairs and replacements to include the replacement of hot water heaters if there is no change in the piping, sizing, power source and the like. The Rule is reprinted below. The Board is well aware that there are great risks in the installation of hot water heaters and that hot water heaters are one of the most dangerous appliances in the typical home. The Board has restricted the minor repair exemption to reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning, gas explosion or injury due to the sudden conversion of hot water to steam.

Licensees should understand two things:

- 1. Contracting or subcontracting work which does not require a license is not a problem or basis for discipline.
- Part for part replacement of a hot water heater, consistent with Board Rule 21 NCAC.0506 (b), does not require a license.

Remember that Board Rule 21 NCAC 50.0506(b) still provides as follows:

#### .0506 MINOR REPAIRS AND ALTERATIONS

(b) the initial installation or the subsequent replacement of a hot water heater in any structure requires a licensed plumbing contractor except that the replacement of a hot water heater with no change in fuel energy source, energy use rate, routing or sizing of venting or piping, constitutes a minor replacement within the meaning of GS 87-21(c).

#### **North Carolina**

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#### **CHANGE OF ADDRESS**

The Board's rule, 21 NCAC 50.0408 (c) reads as follows:

(C) The licensee shall notify the Board of any change in location or mailing address from that shown on the last license renewal invoice within 30 days after the change takes place.

The above rule requires you to notify the Board of a change of address within 30 days after the change takes place. Compliance with this rule benefits you and the Board. The Board is able to keep its records up to date if you notify the office of an address change. The Board is also able to keep you up to date if it has your correct address. Through the newsletter, the Board notifies you of new requirements for licensed contractors, code amendments, educational opportunities, public rule hearings that may affect you, and much more. The newsletter will not get to you if the Board does not have your correct address. The Board notifies you when your license is going to expire and sends you an invoice. This invoice will not get to you if the Board does not have your correct address.

Changes must be in writing with your signature.
